As you know 2013 required a change in venue due to budget cuts at Powder Valley Nature Center. After considering all of our options, we have decided to move the monthly meetings to The Ethical Society. There were two major reasons for this change. January Meeting - Richard Day

Professional nature photographer and MoNEP member, Richard Day will be the presenter at the January 21st meeting. Richard's topic will be *Photo Workflow and Backups*. He will explain the workflow he uses to organize, file, and backup photos for Daybreak Imagery. He'll give tips for photo editing, downloading images and setting up a filing system so you can find your images later. Also included will be a brief processing session followed by a discussion of various backup options.

Richard has been publishing photos and teaching photo workshops since 1984. He specializes in birds, butterflies, dragonflies and backyard habitats. His work has been published in *Audubon*, *Birds & Blooms*, *National Wildlife*, *National Geographic* and many other nature-related publications, calendars and books worldwide. Richard leads photo tours, teaches butterfly and dragonfly workshops and is a guide for Frontiers North to photograph polar bears in Churchill, Manitoba.

Richard and his wife, Susan, own Daybreak Imagery, a stock photography and writing business, near Alma, Illinois. The Days present numerous programs throughout the country each year on backyard wildlife, nature photography and the photo business. November Speaker Recap

Dr. Jim Flasar gave a stunning presentation of some of his underwater images at the November meeting. During his talk, he shared stories of his 28 years of experience diving with and photographing sharks and other sea creatures. He provided information on the equipment and techniques he uses for this very special kind of nature photography. He introduced us to several different species of sharks, including tiger, oceanic white tip, bull and great white sharks. He also included images of the spectacular sailfish and explained their fascinating strategy for herding sardines in a "bait ball". They then take turns grabbing a meal from the school of fish, communicating who goes next by a flash of their sail-like fins. Jim also showed images of a number of other species and the amazing ways they coexist, survive and communicate.

Generally, Jim uses a digital camera with two housings and two strobe lights. He uses a 10-17mm Tokina lens on a Nikon camera. Lighting is challenging so he works on all manual exposure. Our thanks to Jim for a beautiful program and the inspiration to get back in the water for a snorkel or scuba dive and a visit to the beautiful coral reefs, if not specifically the sharks!

Eagle Days

Winter is here and that means that large numbers of bald eagles have moved into the area. The Missouri Department of Conservation will host Eagle Days at several locations around the state this year. For 2014 they have reinstated Eagle Days at the Old Chain of Rocks Bridge on Saturday January 18th and Sunday the 19th from 9 to 3 each day. Eagle Days will once again be held in Clarksville, Missouri, on Saturday January 25th from 9 to 4 and Sunday the 26th from 9 to 3. Both events will feature live eagle presentations along with activities and displays. Spotting scopes to view eagles will also be available. Where to View Winter Birds

If you want to avoid the crowds at Eagle Days but still want to see these fabulous birds, there are many places in the area to reliably view eagles. Some other prime spots for eagle watching include Lock & Dam 24 in Clarksville, Missouri, Lock & Dam 25, East of Winfield and The Riverlands Migratory Bird Sanctuary, on the Missouri side of the river near Alton, Illinois. In addition to eagles, Riverlands has had record numbers of trumpeter swans this year, with nearly 900 seen on January 10th.

Throughout January and early February, from 10 to 2 each day, the Audubon Center at Riverlands is hosting its own celebration of eagles and other birds with *Birds of Winter at Riverlands!* In addition to providing spotting scopes to look out at eagles, trumpeter swans and a great mix of ducks, they will have a raptor on hand each Saturday and an eagle each Sunday. 

March 18th Meeting – Dr. Godfrey Bourne

Dr. Godfrey Bourne, Associate Professor of Evolutionary and Tropical Ecology at the University of Missouri - St. Louis, will be our presenter in March. Dr. Bourne has spent more than 40 years conducting behavioral and ecological research in the country of Guyana. He will be presenting on Rainforests and Savannas of Guyana. His slide program will include his natural history photography and a few of his paintings of bird portraits. He will explain why nutrient poor white sands soil support such high biodiversity on the Guiana Shield in northeastern South America. Dr. Bourne founded and is executive director of the CEIBA Biological Station, a research center on the outskirts of Georgetown, Guyana. Students from universities around the country travel there to study tropical plants, insects, birds and aquatic life. He is also on the board of trustees of the Karanambu Trust, which offers ecology and biology research opportunities to undergraduate and graduate students, as well as operating a full service ecotourism lodge. February Speaker Recap

In his presentation, *From Start to Finish: Photo Workflow, Image Management and Backups*, professional nature photographer Richard Day provided tips for photo editing, setting up a photo filing system and the all important options for backing up your photo library. Richard's workflow consists of downloading his images,

going through two rounds of edits, making adjustments to the images he keeps, adding keywords to each image and then backing everything up. He uses *Adobe Photoshop* and noted that in both *Photoshop* and *Lightroom* you can set up a metadata template with your copyright information. Your copyright will automatically be applied to every image as it is downloaded.

His first round of editing is a rough edit. He deletes any images that are out of focus, poorly composed, contain stray objects or are not well exposed. His second edit is much tighter. As a professional, he does not keep any image that isn't useable. He checks all images of animals at 100% in *Adobe Camera Raw* to make sure the animal's eyes are in focus. If not, he deletes the image. Then he checks composition, the position of the wildlife, exposure and lighting. He deletes anything with a flaw. Of 1,500 images he took of polar bears in 2013, he kept only 200.

Once he has gone through the second round of edits, he does some adjustments within Camera Raw. He checks every image and adjusts exposure, contrast and clarity. Next, Richard opens the image in Photoshop, where he will do some additional edits. He doesn't tend to change the saturation level of his images, but will add a touch of vibrancy. He demonstrated this with a photo of a bison with its very dark head and deep-set dark eye. He created a new layer and used a spot healing brush at 20% opacity to lighten the head around the eye just a touch to make the eye pop. It was very subtle but quite effective. Richard saves both the RAW file and the edited PSD image in two separate locations.

Once he has finished editing the pictures he adds captions and keywords using as much detail as possible. He shared an example of a towhee in the snow. Among his long list of keywords were the bird's common name, its Latin name and 'bird in snow'. Sometimes he isn't searching for an image of a specific bird, but rather for a scene of birds in winter. He also includes what the bird is doing, its location, colors, seasons and behavior. For instance, if the bird is flying or hovering, soaring or hunting, it will be noted in the keywords. All of this makes finding an image of a particular subject much faster.

Richard talked about filing systems. He noted that there are many different filing systems out there but whichever you choose its purpose is to help you find your images. Therefore, he encouraged each of us to think hard about our subjects and how to best organize them in a structure that works for our own searches. He has one main folder of PSDs. Within that he has a separate subfolder for birds, further divided by species. He does the same for butterflies and dragonflies.

Finally, Richard emphasized that backing up your images is critical. He backs up constantly throughout the process. His computers run auto backup everyday, and every 30 days he takes backup hard drives offsite for safe storage. He uses a program called *Retrospect*, which actually makes duplicates of the images. There are also a number of online sites for storage as well.

Holiday Show Heads Up

2015 marks the 20th anniversary of the founding of MoNEP. In honor of that occasion, the board has discussed having a "Best of MoNEP" Holiday Show in December 2015. Although that is a long way off, we wanted to let you know so you can bear it in mind as you photograph and choose images for the 2014 Holiday Show. In 2015, we will glean some of the very best images from past holiday shows, including those submitted in 2014, for our end of the year celebration. That means that members will not submit any images in 2015. So please plan to give us your best shots this year!

Show and Share

It was so nice to see so many more members' images during the March meeting's Show and Share segment. Now that people are getting the hang of submitting their photographs by email each month, it has been suggested that we should take a little more time to learn from each other's images. In fact, part of MoNEP's mission is education. One way we can continually learn and improve our own photography is by viewing and hearing about others' images. To that end, it would be great if members who feel comfortable doing so would talk a little about the images they show. Presenters might mention what drew them to the subject, where the image was taken and what the conditions and lighting were like. One could also include some of the technical aspects such as lens choice, ISO and the aperture and shutter speed used. By sharing this information about the images we show, we can help make this more of a learning experience.

Citizen Science Programs

Spring finally seems to be settling in. The temperatures have moderated and some plants have started to leaf out, adding much welcome green to the landscape. The leafing out and blooming of plants and other natural events tend to follow a predictable pattern. People in and around St. Louis have reported hearing phoebes singing. Spring peepers and other frogs and toads have started calling. Phenology is the study of the timing of these natural events, and many of us participate in this study either informally or formally.

I, and many other people, record the arrival of different birds in my backyard in both spring and fall. I also submit data to several citizen science projects, supplying information to scientists so track they can the population fluctuations of different species or the changes in timing of natural events due to climate change. There are an increasing number of citizen science programs that engage the public in research, while vastly increasing the amount of data scientists can gather. Among a few of these programs are: Project Feeder Watch (Cornell Lab of Ornithology: feederwatch.org), Project **BudBurst** (National Ecological Observatory or NEON: Network budburst.org) and FrogWatch USA, (the Association of Zoos & Aquariums or AZA: aza.org/frogwatch). Participating is relatively easy and fun, and knowing that you are contributing in some small way to scientific understanding is very rewarding. It is also a great way to engage your family outdoors.

March Meeting Recap

Our scheduled speaker for the March meeting, Dr. Godfrey Bourne, was unable to present due to illness. Fortunately for us, **Michelle Jones** and **Don Morice** graciously stepped in to fill the void. They had both joined Dr. Bourne and his college students on trips into the interior of Guyana in 2013 and again in 2014 and were able to share a great deal of information on the ecology and people of Guyana as well as their fine photographs.

Guyana, a country the size of Kansas, located on the northeast coast of South America, has a population of just 750,000 people. 85% of the country is covered by tropical rainforest. The remainder is savanna, open grassland with trees that are not close enough to form a canopy. The country experiences two seasons, the rainy season and a dry season. River levels can vary 20 feet depending upon the season. The soil is mostly nutrient poor white sand, yet it supports an incredible diversity of plants, especially in the rainforest. Don and Michelle shared images of


the varied bird life, as well as mammals such as the giant river otter, giant anteater and the saki monkey. Rivers are abundant and are the primary means of transportation in the country's interior. They are also home to a wealth of fish and two species of crocodiles. The very large black caiman grows up to 15 feet, and the spectacled caiman is less than half that size. They told stories of their adventures in this wondrous place as well as some of the challenges of photographing in an area that is either very bright on the savannas or dark in the midst of the rainforest. We want to thank Don and Michelle for sharing their experiences with us, especially on such short notice. Well done!



April Meeting - Richard Spener

MoNEP member, **Richard Spener**, will present *Taking Better Digital Images* at the **April 15**th meeting. Richard will touch on a range of topics during his presentation including: chasing light in all weather conditions, composition from leading lines and backgrounds to focusing on often overlooked patterns. He will also show examples of the impact of polarizing filters, different shutter speeds, depth of field and the number of megapixels of your camera on the quality of the final image. Richard will compare images shot in Raw vs. Jpg and share examples of images taken using split neutral density filters. There will also be a special section of tips on taking photographs from a kayak or canoe. The program wraps up with different ways to capture sunsets.

Richard is an avid canoeist and kayaker, environmentalist and photographer. He and his wife, Toni, have traveled and paddled extensively throughout the U.S. including numerous trips to Alaska, as well as Central America.

Richard's photographs have been widely published by the St. Louis Post Dispatch, the National Wildlife Federation, St. Louis Audubon and the Alaska Wilderness League. He has had several one-man photo exhibits in the St. Louis area. Richard and Toni recently had a joint exhibit at the Missouri History Museum on 50 Years of Wilderness Through the Lens of Missouri's 8 Wilderness Areas. The exhibit was mounted in honor of the 50th anniversary of the wilderness act and is now traveling around the state. Richard's image of a buffalo at Theodore Roosevelt National Park in North Dakota is the header on the park's website and appears in their 2014 calendar.

According to the Missouri Department of Conservation Natural Events Calendar, these are some of the things we can expect to see during the month of April:


- White Pelicans migrate through Missouri

April Meeting Recap

MoNEP member, Richard Spener, presented Taking Better Digital Images at the April meeting. He reviewed some of the important basics, illustrating his points with examples from his own stunning images. Richard started by talking about chasing light and emphasized how different lighting conditions can have a tremendous impact on your images. He particularly loves to shoot backlit subjects, scenes capturing the beauty of glory light; the warm golden light towards the end of the day and the soft pink light that can come after the sun goes down.

He discussed aspects of composition, including the Rule of Thirds, which often helps create pleasing images. Leading lines are another important compositional element, in that they lead the viewer's eye into and through the image. Backgrounds play an important role in your composition. As you compose the scene, look at all of its elements, including the background before you take the shot.

Patterns can make very interesting subjects, whether you photograph the parts of a flower with its repeated patterns or a mass of gingko leaves. There are lots of patterns in nature.

Richard advocates, "view big and take

small", which means look for the details within a large object, as they may make good subjects themselves. Zoom in and find the image within.

Richard showed examples of the impact of using polarizing filters to make clouds stand out, to remove the glare from water so you can see the rocks on the bottom of a lake, or to make the colors of fall leaves pop.

He reviewed the effect of using different shutter speeds and f-stops, on the resulting image. Richard talked about and showed examples of the flexibility provided by shooting in raw format rather than ipeq. He described ipeg as being akin to shooting slide film, where you have to be right on the mark with your settings because once it is shot there is not much you can do to adjust the image. Shooting in raw allows you the freedom to adjust your images significantly in digital postprocessing. That includes being able to apply a graduated neutral density filter in Adobe Lightroom!

In addition to being a superb photographer, Richard is an avid canoeist and kayaker. He talked about preparing, carrying and using his camera gear when on the water.

Richard ended by encouraging us to try different things and to have fun. Thank you, Richard, for a great talk!

May Meeting - Insects

Our speakers for the **May 20**th meeting will be **Yvonne Homeyer** and **Pat Garner**. Their presentation will focus on how photography can provide a unique opportunity for observing the world of insects. Using photos they have taken in the St. Louis area, they will examine a number of butterfly, dragonfly, and other insect species with an emphasis on interesting or unusual behaviors that would go unnoticed without the aid of close-up photography.

Yvonne is a Brentwood resident and practices law in her own firm in Clayton in the areas of family law, divorce mediation, and estate planning. She is a member of the Board of Directors of the **North American Butterfly Association** (NABA), and is the current President of the St. Louis Chapter of NABA. When not in the office, she can usually be found in the field with her binoculars and camera. Her initial interest in bird watching quickly expanded into butterflies, dragonflies, damselflies, and wildflowers – and photography.

Pat Garner and her husband live outside Hawk Point in Lincoln County on 45 acres of mixed habitat, including woods, open fields, and a pond. Many native species of plants and trees are found on their land, providing an abundance of host plants and nectaring plants for butterflies. As a result, Pat has observed and photographed approximately 65 butterfly species on their land. That accounts for almost 2/3 of all the species seen in the St. Louis area! A wide variety of dragonfly and damselfly species are also present on their property. Pat is an accomplished photographer who delights in telling stories with her images.

May Meeting Recap


Local butterfly enthusiasts, **Yvonne Homeyer** and **Pat Garner**, gave the May presentation on the identification, life stages and behavior of butterflies, dragonflies, damselflies and other insects of the St. Louis region. They took turns presenting and shared their own images of some colorful and amazing insects. Many insects tend to move so quickly that photography is a great way to capture their images for identification, as some of their field marks are subtle.

Yvonne is the current President of the St. Louis Chapter of the North American **Butterfly Association** (NABA) and serves on the Board of Directors of the national NABA. Pat lives on a 45-acre farm in Lincoln County with many native plants that provide the right host and nectar plants for butterflies. She has actually identified 72 different species of butterflies on her property. There are a total of 109 species listed for all of the St. Louis area. As Yvonne pointed out. the diversity on Pat's property is remarkable. In St. Louis there are seven families of butterflies. The classification hierarchy is: Kingdom > Phylum > Class > Order > Family > Genus > Species. Butterflies have smooth antennae with knobbed ends as compared to moths, which have May Meeting Recap, cont'd.

feathery antennae and are generally nocturnal. Another difference is that moth caterpillars spin cocoons from the silk they produce. A butterfly forms a chrysalis from the inside out. Within the moth's cocoon and the butterfly's chrysalis, the insects go through metamorphosis and emerge as adults. They showed images of butterflies "puddling"; gathering on the ground to drink up minerals and salts from the moist soil. We also saw examples of the five stages or instars of caterpillars. The spicebush swallowtail caterpillar starts out green and turns gold as it enters its fifth instar.

In addition to discussing butterflies, Yvonne and Pat showed many pictures of stunningly colored dragonflies and their relatives, the damselflies. Damselflies are daintier than dragonflies and, when perched, they hold their wings folded above Dragonflies, their backs. when perched, typically hold their wings spread out to their sides, forming the letter "t". During hot weather some dragonflies will raise their abdomens vertically to help cool down.

We saw an amazing variety of insects and gleaned some good tips for photographing them. Thanks, Yvonne and Pat, for sharing your knowledge and love of insects!

May Field Trip Recap

Fourteen members attended the May field trip to Valley View Glades. The majority of the members met at the designated spot for those who wanted to carpool and a few met the group at the glade. Temperatures were cooler than normal for the middle of May, with temperatures in the low 40's to start and calm winds. There was fog in the valleys along the way.

Indian paintbrush and Freemont's leather flower were in bloom and were plentiful on the glade. Missouri evening primrose was present in the area, but it was not blooming on most of the glade. Members saw a large number of butterflies, the majority of which were checker spots. Some of the birds that were noted were indigo buntings, summer tanagers and a possible cerulean warbler.

Bright blue skies made shooting in the open glade a bit of a challenge so people found it best to shoot along the edges of the glade or they found the use of a diffuser helpful. Because of the number of people who attended, several members were able to help each other with setups by holding diffusers for others. The wind started picking up at about 8:30 a.m. and the last members left at nearly 10:30 after chatting in the parking lot



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July Meeting - Scott Evers

MoNEP member, **Scott Evers**, will present the program at the **July 15**th meeting. He will cover the many options that are available for processing digital images. Scott will cover workflow from the export of files from the camera through the editing process to the final step of printing. He will discuss various popular software programs for processing and editing digital images. He will provide onscreen demonstrations and advice on how to edit digital photos to bring out the best quality possible.

Scott has been a life long photography enthusiast and a professional freelance photographer since 2005. While his passion and focus are on nature and landscape images, he has a diverse clientele who hire him for many different types of photography. He has worked with interior architects, designers, builders and government organizations. His nature oriented prints grace the main lobby of Anderson Hospital in Maryville, Illinois, and the Ronald McDonald Houses at Cardinal Glennon Children's Hospital and St. John's Mercy Hospital in St. Louis, Missouri. Scott's work has appeared in magazines, newspapers, various periodicals and on websites. Scott has won awards in photography contests from the National Parks Foundation, The Nature Conservancy and Encyclopedia Britannica.

Scott is a member of Canon Professional Services and the National Association of Photoshop Professionals. His passion for continuing education and training help keep him abreast of the most current trends and changes in the ever-changing world of digital photography.

August Meeting - Bruce Schuette

Bruce Schuette will be presenting on the work of the Missouri Prairie Foundation at the August meeting. Bruce is a retired Park Naturalist with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. He was based at Cuivre River State Park. He has been active on the board of the Missouri Prairie Foundation for many years and is its Vice President of Science and Management.

June Meeting Recap

Ray Kersting of Schiller's was the presenter at the June meeting. He talked about and demonstrated some of the latest equipment and tools. Ray started the program with a brief reminder of the importance of monitor calibration for color management in processing and printing images. He recommended several X-Rite products, including ColorMunki and their i1 Display Pro. He recommended calibrating monitors at least once a week.

The other topics he covered were all related: tripods, macro-photography and off-camera flash. Ray shared a number of different and amazing tripods with us. He talked about the advances in lightweight tripods from the sturdy carbon fiber tripods to the MePhoto fold up travel tripod, which will fit neatly into a bag or your carry on and can support up to 13 pounds. He showed us a number of models with center columns that come out and can be used in the horizontal position for macro work. Others have legs that can be positioned in various ways and levels to get your camera closer to the subject. Ray had a \$79 Kiwi macro-focusing rail with dual focusing motion, which he said was very comparable to the more expensive rails, allowing the photographer to focus more precisely.

He talked about macro lenses, including the Nikon 105mm micro with vibration reduction and the Canon 100mm macro f/2.8 lens with image stabilization. Ray said the Canon is one of the sharpest lenses available. He also touted the Tamron 90mm f/2.8 macro with vibration control. It is very well made and is a great value at \$749.

Ray then moved on to ways to light macro subjects. He showed an inexpensive LED ring you can place over your lens, which works well in a pinch. He discussed the virtues and complexities of Canon and Nikon ring flashes and then introduced us to the easier to use Nissin flash with TTL (Through The Lens) exposure adjustment. One of the fastest developing trends in flash is the use of multiple offcamera flashes, which are synced with one another and triggered by the use of radio transmitters. These work much better than the old infrared triggers. He particularly likes the Phottix Mitros+, which is both a receiver and a transmitter, and the Phottix Odin Flash TTL Flash Trigger and Receivers. Finally, he discussed ways to soften the harshness of flash by using devices such as the Rogue Soft Box Kit to diffuse the light on the subject. Fong is another company that makes an array of devices for modifying flash, including easy to use hoods for placing over the pop up flash unit of your camera.

We thank Ray for a very informative talk and for kindly staying around so members had a chance to look over, and ask about the many products he had brought along.



July Speaker Recap

Scott Evers, an avid member of the National Association of Photoshop Professionals, began his program in July with a beautiful slide show highlighting some of his photos from his travels throughout the U.S.

Scott then discussed the ten steps he uses for processing his images.

White balance: Adjusting white balance is probably the single biggest improvement you can make to your image. If WB is not set correctly in the camera, your colorcast can be off. In RAW format, this can be adjusted to better match the real scene or be adjusted creatively to make the image warmer or cooler.

Exposure: Exposure compensation allows you to recover detail in the shadow and highlight areas of an image. Use the histogram as a guide.

Noise reduction: Every photo has noise or grain. The higher the ISO you use, the more noise the image contains, and the more the image will benefit from noise reduction.

Lens correction: Certain lenses are susceptible to distortion, vignetting or chromatic aberration. These are caused by a number of factors: low f-stops or because of certain lenses. These can be corrected but you need to be do this very carefully.

Detail: This refers to the sharpening, clarity and local contrast of an image due to the softening caused by the camera's sensor. Be careful, as it is possible to over sharpen an image. When done well, it can make a big difference in the quality of an image.

Contrast: RAW images look flat, and the contrast needs to be adjusted to help make the image pop. You can set the black and white points for your image, or you can also use the levels and curves tools to adjust contrast.

Framing: Cropping photographs can dramatically strengthen the image's composition. Although there are no universal rules, there are some good guidelines for what makes a strong image such as the rule of thirds.

Refinements: In this step you can adjust saturation, vibrance and other color adjustments. You can also clean up the image by removing spots and dust. Important tools to use include: the healing brush, clone tool, layer masks and adjustment.

Resizing: At this point you should enlarge your image for printing or downsize it for web or e-mail use.

Output sharpening: The very last step of the process is to sharpen the image according to its final format.

August Speaker - Bruce Schuette

Long-time MoNEP member and professional naturalist, Bruce Schuette will be presenting Prairies of the St. Louis Region at the August 19th meeting. He will discuss the extensive, but largely forgotten, prairie heritage of St. Louis. Bruce grew up in the prairies of north St. Louis County, although he states that he was 200 years too late to get the full experience. He received a Bachelor's Degree in Wildlife Management from the University of Missouri-Columbia. For 36 years he has been involved with managing and restoring prairie, glade and woodland ecosystems and educating others about our natural resources. Bruce has been on the Board of the Missouri Prairie Foundation since 2001 and is currently its Vice President for Science and Management.

Bill Lea Seminar Recap

People who attended the MoNEP seminar found Bill Lea to be a delightful presenter and an extremely gifted and humble photographer. The morning started off with Bill talking with both new and existing members and signing his books before the seminar began.

When we all moved into the auditorium, Bill's first session served as an introduction. He presented a slideshow of his images and provided insight into his style and philosophy of photography. He indicated that he is more focused on the art of photography than the technical end of it. He prefers to shoot in overcast and rainy conditions and pays close attention to the weather to determine what and where he shoots. Weather helps convey feeling to the image. He stressed the value of photographing the same areas repeatedly since the light and weather are always different. He often composes around color and makes sure to shoot his subject both horizontally and vertically. He talked about the tools that he considers to be essential in addition to his camera: a polarizing filter, shutter release cord and a tripod. He uses 17-35, 28-70 and 70-300mm lenses. The 70-300 allows him to shoot landscapes and then the scenes within the scene.

His second topic was light, which he feels is his driving force. Light dictates what and where he shoots. Bill feels that learning to capture quality light is the secret to becoming a good nature photographer. He likes the low angled light of the early morning or late afternoon coming in at a right angle to the subject, so that the shadows created give more depth to the subject. Sunny conditions support shooting large scenes, while overcast skies support more intimate scenes. Whereas front-lit pictures can be cold, backlit scenes provide more warmth.

In the next session, Bill discussed the basics of good wildlife photography: composition, backgrounds, perspective and image format. He encouraged us to get to know our subjects, so that we can anticipate their actions and behaviors. He tries to shoot wildlife from a low angle, avoid busy backgrounds and provide enough room within the frame for the subject to have space.

The afternoon session started with a talk about the best way to shoot photos in the rain and the equipment that is required. Bill loves the quality of the light that occurs when it rains and finds that rain softens, gives depth to the scene and creates a mood. However, there are challenges to shooting in the rain, such as protecting your equipment. Bill had a very innovative solution that included a large umbrella and a bracket for holding it on a tripod. He went on to describe methods for shooting different subjects such as waterfalls, swamps and streams in the rain.

The day ended with Bill discussing his recent book about photography in Everglades National Park and how to shoot good landscapes without the benefit of hills in the background. He finished up by sharing many great images of one of his favorite subjects, black bears, as he talked about their interesting traits and behaviors.

At the end of the day, Bill encouraged us to use our skills in photography, as he does, to help save those species and habitats that are endangered or threatened. Thank you, Bill, for such a great seminar and lots to ponder!

August Speaker Recap

Bruce Schuette, а professional naturalist and a long-time MoNEP member, presented a program on the Prairies of the St. Louis Region at the August meeting. He discussed the strong prairie heritage of St. Louis, which could be considered the nation's first prairie city. He explained that the site of the Missouri Botanical Garden was a tall grass prairie ecosystem at the time of European settlement in the region. There were 24,000+ acres of prairie in just the city of St. Louis and it stretched to the northwest as far as the eye could see. It reached into Ferguson, Florissant, St. Peters and north in the Mississippi River Bottoms.

Missouri was historically dominated by five distinct ecosystems including tall grass prairies, barrens or scrublands (including glades and savanna), open woodlands, woodlands and dense forest. In St. Louis, prairie and savanna, or open woodland, were predominant. There was little dense forest in this area. Prairies are grasslands with few if any trees, although not all grassy areas are prairies. The prairies here consisted of a variety of very tall native grasses and forbs (non-grass, non-woody flowering plants).

8,000 years ago the climate in this area was warm and dry. This enabled the advance of prairies into what is now St. Louis city and county. Fires set by natural forces such as lightening, and especially by Native Americans kept the prairies open, preventing the growth of trees. Bison and elk also lived in the grassland ecosystems and grazed on it, further keeping the trees at bay.

Tall grass prairies are a rich and productive ecosystem. They are home to a large number of different plant species and countless animals, especially insects. Large tracts of prairie would have a couple hundred or more different plant species.

Prairie plants are well adapted for Missouri's hot and dry summers. One adaptation that enables prairie plants to survive our arid conditions is their very deep root systems, which are longer than the plant is tall. Because their roots can reach 12-15 foot deep prairie plants can survive severe droughts. Most prairie plants are longlived perennials that thrive with fire, because their growing tips are actually located just beneath the surface of the soil. Additionally, as these roots die and decompose, the soil becomes enriched by their nutrients. The rich, deep soil drew famers to the area and led to the conversion of the prairie to the grain-growing region it became after the invention of a plow that could break through the dense soil.


There were many different species of plants and animals that occurred here 200 years ago but which can no longer be found this far east in the state. Only a few acres of original native prairie remain today. Some examples can be found at Cuivre River State Park, and maybe at some of the privately held duck clubs in northern St. Charles county.

Prairies are not only biologically rich, but they are exceedingly endangered. There is very little virgin prairie left in Missouri. You can only find prairie

remnants at places that were hard to plow. Tucker Prairie, about 100 miles west of St. Louis, is our closest sizeable native prairie.

The Missouri Prairie Foundation (MPF), The Nature Conservancy (TNC), the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) have been instrumental in protecting and maintaining the few prairie remnants in the state. The MPF works to protect and restore the region's prairies and glades and owns over twelve prairies. They maintain the prairies by facilitating prescribed burns and the removal invasive plants. They also reconstruct prairies. One of the benefits of doing so is that the plants hold the soil and can take in and store tremendous amounts of carbon from the atmosphere. Increased carbon in the atmosphere is one of the primary contributors to global warming.

The work of MPF, TNC, DNR and MDC is critical to preserving these endangered places. Thank you, Bruce, for all your years of hard work protecting and restoring prairies and other communities. We also appreciate your role in educating people, including your fellow MoNEP members, about this beautiful jewel of an ecosystem.

September Speaker Recap

Robert Bullivant, owner of Bullivant Gallerv and Consulting, photographer and a master printer. Robert discussed the process of professional photo printing. He works with artists, photographers and interior designers to create beautiful prints. He collaborates with photographers on their color management and the printing process and offers customers an array of the highest quality papers. Robert discussed color theory, first reviewing the evolution of color photography in the latter part of the 20th century. He reminded us that color photographs have only been around for the past 100 years. He discussed the difference between the RGB color spectrum, an additive process, versus CMYK color, a subtractive process. Today with digitally coated paper, ink jet printers shoot ink down onto the paper and mix colors much like a painter would. Today's basic inkjet printers use CMYK and mix these to create the four-color spectrum. Higher printers include more color options to get more range. At his studio, Robert uses large Canon printers with twelve color durable pigment inks.

One of the issues that we as photographers face is that we are working with numerous devices that

create color in different ways. How can we get what we shoot to look right on both the monitor and on paper?

The challenge is to make them all see color in the same way. Our cameras have a color profile. We need to create color profiles for our monitors and one for each type of paper we use to create a print, so they are all "seeing" color the same way. There are many useful tools to help us do that. Robert advocates using a good colorimeter to calibrate your monitor and doing so regularly in a fairly dark room with neutral walls.

Robert talked about paper selection and his partnership with Hahnemühle Fine Art Papers. Papers come in many bases including cotton rag. alpha cellulose and synthetic bases, Each paper designed for inkjet processing has a special coating that provides for maximum color range and sharpness. Robert also suggests previewing your print under a color accurate light source. He has a viewing booth with a 5.000 degree Kelvin light, which is the color of daylight. At home, you can place prints on a gray table under a 5,000 K bulb to check accuracy. October Speaker - Jody Williams

Local photographer, **Jody Williams**, will present **The Bartrams in My Backyard** at the **October 21st** meeting. Carl Linnaeus, credited with introducing the binomial classification system, described John Bartram as "the greatest natural botanist in the world". Botanist to King George III, John Bartram and his son William, were considered America's first naturalists and commercial nurserymen. They explored the American Colonies from New England to Florida and west to Lake Ontario and the Mississippi River. They discovered and collected seeds and plants, which they cultivated on their farm outside Philadelphia in the 1700's. They supplied plants to Washington's Mount Vernon and Jefferson's Monticello and established a substantial trade with the aristocrats of England and Europe.

Local photographer and botanical artist, Jody Williams has identified and photographed over 150 of the historical plants associated with the Bartrams that grow in the St. Louis region and in the St. Francois mountains south of St. Louis. She will share some of these images during the program along with the often-overlooked story of these historical figures.

Jody is Vice President of the American Society of Botanical Artists (ASBA), which curated Following in the Bartrams Footsteps - Contemporary Botanical Artists Explore the Bartrams' Legacy, a nationally travelling exhibition of original artwork of plants associated with the Bartrams. Williams received a grant from ASBA to explore and identify the Bartram plants that grow in the St. Louis

Louis region, create watercolor paintings of a selection of the plants and increase public awareness of the Bartrams' story through lectures to the public. 

October Field Trip

There were about ten people who met on a cool, crisp morning just before sunrise to travel to the Glassberg Conservation Area for the October Field Trip. We hiked a short way to the lake. There was no breeze to the early morning air, so the lake was as smooth as a mirror reflecting the striking oranges, yellow and reds of the trees. We were all soon involved in photographing the beauty around us. The colors became more alive as the sun rose above the woods. It was a beautiful, peaceful way to spend the morning.

October Meeting Recap

During the October meeting, artist Jody Williams shared the story of art, science and exploration in colonial America and contemporary Missouri. Her talk focused on John Bartram of Philadelphia, who lived from 1699 to 1777. In 1728, he purchased 102 acres of land just six miles from the center of Philadelphia and went on to amass the varied collection of North American plants in the world at that time. His farm became the hub of international plant knowledge. He was a self-taught botanist, who traveled mostly alone and then later with his son, William, throughout New England,

south to Florida and west to Lake Ontario and the Mississippi. He collected seeds and plant specimens and was credited with discovering and propagating 200 species of North American plants. He was America's first great native botanist, and he established a transatlantic business spanned that four generations. His plants ended up in the royal collections at Kew and the botanical gardens at Oxford and Edinburgh. Washington and Jefferson purchased plants for their estates.

In 1762, Bartram received a large order from a London nurseryman who wanted southern U.S. plants. Bartram set off for the South to collect plants with his son, William. Bartram sent the collection to London, where it was met by Carl Linnaeus' star pupil, Daniel Solander. Solander discovered that half of the plants in it were unknown to science. In 1764, Bartram sent seed to King George, who made him the King's Botanist in 1765.

Bartam's son, William followed in his father's footsteps. He was an artist and collector and, in 1773, obtained a patronage to continue drawing and collecting plants and seeds. He made a four-year expedition and wrote a book: Travels through North and South Carolina, Georgia, East and West Florida, the Cherokee Country.

etc., which was published in 1791. His book was well received in England and influenced the writing of Romantic authors of the time. His work also transformed the English garden from a very formal French and Italian style of turf and topiary to the lovely informal landscape gardens we now associate with England. By the mid-18th century, American plants were flooding into England for horticultural use. The Bartram's nursery business continued to flourish and you can find many American plants in British landscapes.

Jody and other members of the American Society of Botanical Artists (ASBA) curated Following in the Bartrams Footsteps - Contemporary Botanical Artists Explore the Bartrams' Legacy, an exhibition of original artwork of plants associated with the Bartrams. Jody received a grant to bring the Bartram's story here and for the past year has identified and photographed over 162 of historical plants associated with the Bartrams that grow in the St. Louis region and the St. François mountains south of us. She used both Edgar Dennison's Missouri Wildflowers and Steyermark's Flora of Missouri to identify the plants. She shared some of her beautiful images of many of the plants she has found, and, we thank her for a very interesting talk.

November Meeting – Steve Sands

Join us at the November meeting to learn about our sun from Steve Sands, an amateur astronomer for over 35 years. Steve will talk about our sun, a common yellow dwarf star, which supplies all of the light and warmth required for sustaining life here on earth. Yet, few people understand its importance, stark beauty nature. During this presentation he will explain how and why the sun behaves the way it does, various solar phenomena such as transits and eclipses, solar activity that can be observed and how to safely view and photograph this very active and ever changing star. Some of the equipment he uses for his solar studies will be available for explanation and review. There will be ample time for questions during and after the presentation.

Steve is the astronomer for the Lewis & Clark Confluence Tower in Hartford, Illinois, the Watershed Nature Center in Edwardsville and the Heartland Prairie and the Sierra Club in Alton. Steve has been an adjunct faculty member at St. Louis University and Washington University teaching astronomy, telescopes and optics to non-science majors. He has written articles for Astronomy Technology Today, Sky & Telescope and Amateur Astronomy magazines. He is a member and past president of the St. Louis Astronomical Society (SLAS) and has held literally hundreds of public telescope viewing sessions, promoting observational astronomy. Steve designs and builds telescopes and telescope systems, as well as restoring historical instruments. Steve doesn't classify himself as a specialist and eniovs all areas of observing, including solar, lunar, planetary and deep sky observing.



Shaw Photography Series

The Shaw Photography Series continues in December with *Creating Your Own Light: Flash and Flashlights for Plant Photography* at Shaw Nature Reserve.

This daylong class with award-winning nature photographer, **Greg Basco**, will be held **December 7**th. This program is designed for experienced photographers of at least intermediate skill who have a working knowledge of their flash unit. Greg, who is originally from St. Louis, lives in Costa Rica and has to rely upon flash for much of his nature photography. He will share his techniques for creating your own light using flash and flashlights. Greg has presented at MoNEP twice and is a very popular speaker,

The morning will start with a presentation of Greg's work describing the lighting techniques and set-ups he used for each image. Then we will put his methods to use by photographing different set-ups requiring a variety of lighting techniques. In the afternoon, we will continue putting what was learned in the morning into practice. Participants should have a good understanding of basic exposure and natural light and concepts such as aperture, ISO and shutter speed. You will need a DSLR or advanced point-and-shoot camera, a hot shoe mounted flash that can be used off camera and a wide angle to telephoto lens or lenses.

Please note that although we will be using plants as our focus for this program, the methods are applicable to other nature subjects. Shaw Nature Reserve is beautiful this time of year and, weather permitting, we may have the opportunity to shoot outdoors.


