# March 15th Meeting - Mark Glenshaw on Owls

Join us on March 15th for How to Find An Owl in Your Neighborhood, with Mark H.X. Glenshaw, also known as The Owl Man. Mark has studied great horned owls in Forest Park since December, 2005. Mark's talk will show which owls you are most likely to see or hear in the metro area, where to look for them, how to look for them in a safe and ethical manner, what to listen for, and the importance of research and collaboration.

Mark is an award-winning naturalist who gives dozens of lectures on the owls all over Missouri and Illinois. He leads scores of owl prowls in

Forest Park each year. He shares his work on his blog, Forest Park Owls, which you can find at: <a href="forestparkowls.blogspot.com">forestparkowls.blogspot.com</a>. The owls and his work with them have received regular coverage from local and regional media outlets spanning the spectrum of TV, radio, print and the web. He was awarded the Citizen Scientist Award by the Academy of Science-St. Louis in 2006. Mark is a Certified Interpretive Guide, a certified Missouri Master Naturalist and a volunteer for Forest Park Forever. In addition to this, he helps people all over the St. Louis metro area find owls in their neighborhoods whether in subdivisions, city neighborhoods, pocket parks, or large public parks. When not studying owls, Mark works at Fontbonne University where he is the Manager of University Services.

### April 19th Meeting - William Fields on Art Photography

William Fields is a full-time art photographer and published author. In his presentation at the April 19th meeting, he will primarily discuss his photo work since 2015. Bill was honored as Artist in Residence at Fort Union National Monument in Watrous, New Mexico in 2019. Portions of his presentation will include images from the Missouri River Valley around Hermann, New Mexico, the Colorado Plateau, and various foreign travels.

Bill grew up among dairy farms, orchards, and truck farms. This rural environment cultivated his love of nature and landscape. At age 8 he got his first camera, Image courtesy: William Fields a Kodak Brownie box. He was only able to afford to



process black and white film. Those early experiences imprinted him with a love of monochromatic images and led to his later explorations of infrared photography.

In the 1960s he served in the navy near Israel during the 1966 conflicts with Syria and Palestinians on the West Bank. He was later assigned to a carrier flying squadron as a plane captain. While serving, he bought his first 35mm camera, a Canon Rangefinder. The Canon images were like night and day by comparison with the fuzzy images he had been shooting with his Brownie.

After his naval service, he traveled extensively before going to university. He worked for over 30 years in aerospace, laser technology, and automotive industries. Due to his work, Bill has lived in eleven states, settling in Missouri in 1993. Throughout his years of "bread winning" he continued to study, practice and execute works of art and became ever more proficient in printmaking, watercolor painting and photography. His devotion to art has been a lifelong passion.

His books include Hermann, Missouri - One of the Prettiest Towns in America and his limited-edition The Four Directions - A Southwestern Journey, which won first place in the 2019 Independent Publishers Awards for Best Coffee Table Book.

### **Show & Share**

Please follow the submission and file naming guidelines below to submit images for Show and Share:

- Resize your images so vertical images are 1,800 pixels high and horizontal images are 1,800 pixels wide.
- Name your images using your last name then first name and the year and month of submission as well as the subject. For example, SmithJane-2022-01-Subject. No spaces please!
- Save your images as .jpg files. Your saved images should be less than 4 MB in size.
- Compress your five resized images into a zip file. (If you don't know how to do this step, just send them as they are)
- Attach the zip file or images to an email addressed to share@monep.org by midnight Saturday, March 12th for the March meeting and April 16th for the April meeting.
